Humorist Study and Project Proposal

Please label the two parts of the assignment, and follow all instructions below.

Overview:

Your humor proposal contains two essential parts: 1.) a 2-page study of two humorists of your choice; 2.) a description of your project for teacher approval. The purpose of combining your Humorist Study with your Proposal is to show that you have found inspirations and models for the kind of Humor Project you want to create.

Part 1 – The Humorist Study (2 pages, single-spaced)

An important cornerstone of your Humor project is the study of two professional humorists who have done work that inspires you to make comedy of your own. I encourage you to read/view/listen to multiple works by each humorist, but I suggest you pick one piece per humorist to compare in the sections below.

Parts:

- Analysis: In the first single-spaced page, compare and contrast their subject matter, themes and styles, using terms from the <u>Comedy Toolbox</u>. Focus your analysis on showing how at least one piece of comedy from each humorist works, and explain how and why they are similar/different.
- **Reflection:** Then, in another 1-page, single-spaced page, reflect on which subjects/themes and techniques you find most inspirational and valuable in considering *your own* project.

Considerations:

- You may opt to include outside research to supplement each of these sections, especially if you are interested in connecting which comedians influenced their work or criticism/reviews. However, outside research is not required.
- You will need to include a Works Cited for all sources used in your study section.
- The Humorist Study is worth 75% of the grade for this assignment, while the Proposal below is work the remaining 25%.
- Heads up: You are <u>required</u> to explain at the end of your Humor Project performance/recording your comedic influences, which is also where this assignment comes in handy!

Irony: In writing and speaking, irony is using words to express something completely different from the literal meaning. There are several forms of irony: *Verbal irony (such as sarcasm)* is a disparity of expression and intention: when a speaker says one thing but means another Satire: wit that is critical humor. Satire is sarcasm that makes fun of something. Understatement: stating something in restrained terms, or as less than it is.

5.) Why do you think this is the right humor project for you? (If you have a group, can you assure me that everyone is invested in this idea and you won't have trouble getting everyone to contribute meaningfully?) What makes you excited about this idea? What are some potential pitfalls you wish to avoid?
